
CHANGUS

Chiangus are not only the proven, number one carcass animal in the beef industry, but the product of a breeding regimen designed to produce the best return per animal unit in the cattle business today.

Chiangus is a breed in its own right, an amalgam of the ultimate terminal breed, Chianina, and the leading maternal breed in the industry, the Angus. They incorporate the outstanding carcass characteristics of both.

Joined in a program under the auspices of the ACA, this blending produces premium cattle at every stage of the upbreeding process. Chiangus dominate all other breeds in the steer show arena, the feedlot and the beef box.

The basic elements in the Chiangus upbreeding program are as follows:



Each generation is a Chiangus. Each is registerable. All are marketable at premium prices, both because of their function in the upbreeding process and because of their enhanced production and carcass values.

The breeding up process is based on generations of breeding rather than on percentages of the basic breeds as found in other composites, except that a Chiangus can be no less than 1/8 and no more than 3/4 Chianina and the balance Angus. It must be polled or scurred, can have a white underline and no additional white.

The possible combinations in upbreeding are as follows:

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NOTE: Chiangus calves born after January 1, 1994 must be 2CA or PCA to compete in ACA sponsored shows.

In the Chiangus regimen, each succeeding generation of upbreeding adds to the monetary value of the cattle produced due to the breeding impetus it adds toward the PCA or purebred status, and because of the increased consistency and predictability, it adds to the breeding program.

Chiangus Rules and Regulations

- Members breeding Chiangus cattle shall be bound by and shall at all times observe and comply with the Society's Constitution and these Rules.
- The Council shall administer the affairs of the Chiangus breed of cattle.
- 3. Application for Registration must be completed on the official forms.
- Chiangus cattle registered shall be entered in the Chiangus herd register and issued a pedigreed certificate of registration.
- 5. Chiangus cattle are to contain Angus and Chianina blood only.
- Chiangus are to have no less than ¼ and no more than ¾ of either Angus or Chianina blood percentages.
- Chianina and Angus bulls and females used in a Chiangus programme must be purebred or fullblood but not necessarily registered.
- Third generation Chiangus cattle are considered pure and are eligible for exhibition at Royal Shows upon acceptance by the Show Society.
- 9. Chiangus cattle maybe polled or scurred only.
- Chiangus are to be black or dark grey in colour only, no brindles or stripes.
- 11. The letter 'X' identifies the animal as being a Chiangus on the certificates of registration.
- The year code for Chiangus is to continue in alphabetical order from the letter W for calves born in 2025.
 - Note: the letter "I" is not used as the society uses it to denote AI Sires and Dams imported from Italy.
- Chiangus cattle entered in the herd register must be tattooed with the breeder's herd identification, year code, animals number and the letter 'X'.

14. FEES – Registration fees

- 1st and 2nd generation females and bulls are \$5,
- 3rd generation animals \$5; and
- Transfer fees for females, bulls and calves is \$5 per animal.
